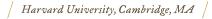

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Introduction

Welcome to the 47th annual Christmas Revels!

At the height of the Renaissance, Venice is at the crossroads of the world. In its bustling piazzas, merchants from the East are rubbing shoulders with artists from the West. Traders and bankers do business under the watchful eye of the Doge, the shrewd elder of the city-state. Fine art and coarse entertainment compete for attention and in this whirlpool of activity, Venice is giving birth to some of the most beautiful music the old world has ever heard.

But pressure is mounting. Right now, as the seasonal Feast of the Seven Fishes approaches, the Doge is being asked to decide everything from urgent matters of state to the best poem, from legal opinions to his preferred spaghetti sauce. His magistrate is ambitious. Politicians and lobbyists are jostling for influence. The Doge urgently needs a little personal time for reflection. If only there were a Renaissance superpower that would allow him to broaden his horizons and get a different perspective on his beloved city!

And Io! Unbeknownst to the Doge, Fate is slyly introducing a troupe of down-at-the-heel actors fresh from their unsuccessful tour of Europe. Will all these destinies entwine? Stranger things have happened in the serene republic of Venice!

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1. CANZONA PER SONARE TWO Giovanni Gabrieli (1557–1612)

Cambridge Symphonic Brass Ensemble

One of the most famous composers of his time, Gabrieli is best known for the multi-choir ceremonial brass and sacred choral works that continue to fill the great Cathedral of San Marco and churches around the world. After traveling in Europe, he returned to his birthplace of Venice in 1584 and held the post of organist at San Marco until his death.

2. LA ME NÒNA L'È VECCHIERÈLLA Trentino Folk Song

The Revels Ragazzi

The playful words of this song can be translated as: "My granny is a little old lady. She sends me to the fountain to get water for supper. She says goodbye!"

3. CAPONA/CANARIO Giovanni Girolamo Kapsberger (1580–1651)

Nathaniel Cox, *theorbo* • Simon Martyn-Ellis, *Baroque guitar* • Fabio Pirozzolo, *djembe* Prolific composer of Baroque pieces for lute and theorbo, Kapsberger was of Italian/Austrian heritage. He helped popularize plucked instruments in Europe and composed music for instrumental dance ensembles and the stage.

4. QUANNO NASCETTE NINNO Sant'Alfonso Maria De Liguori (1696–1787)

Daniel Meyers, *zampogna* • Fabio Pirozzolo, *frame drum* • The Revels Chorus Megan Henderson, *choral arrangement*

"The Christmas mass in the Campania region almost always starts with a group of *zampogna* and *ciaramella* players, dressed as shepherds, entering the church playing this carol," Daniel Meyers remarks.

All Sing Third Verse!

Out on a hill so dark, the shepherd's pipe so clear, proclaiming joy that swells to the stars as they appear. Stars in the heavens so far from the earth, Stars in the sky announce a new birth, This shortest day of the year. Let shepherds sound their joy so that all the world may hear.



5. TOCCATA Claudio Monteverdi (1567–1643)

Cambridge Symphonic Brass Ensemble

This is the opening toccata from the beloved and still widely performed opera, *L'Orfeo* (1607), which is based on a Greek myth in which Orpheus valiantly attempts to rescue his wife from the dead.

6. 0 SANCTISSIMA Traditional Sicilian Hymn

Cambridge Symphonic Brass Ensemble • The Revels Ragazzi Coro San Marco • Patrick Swanson, *text* • George Emlen, *choral arrangement* Megan Henderson, *brass arrangement*

This prayer for protection is also known as the "Sicilian Mariners Hymn."



7. DAMIGELLA TUTTA BELLA Claudio Monteverdi (1567–1643)

Sophie Michaux, *mezzo soprano* • Gideon Crevoshay, *tenor* • Lysander Jaffe, *violin* Daniel Meyers, *recorder* • Simon Martyn-Ellis, *baroque guitar* • Nathaniel Cox, *theorbo* Fabio Pirozzolo, *bodhran & tambourine* • Coro San Marco

The soprano sings: "Beautiful damsel, pour that sweet wine, make fall the dew distilled from the rubies."

8. PIRU PIRU Italian Folk Song

David Coffin, tenor gemshorn • The Revels Ragazzi

A pastoral song about a shepherd playing his pipes and a farm girl from the mountain who carries a basket full of chestnuts.

9. RÍU RÍU CHÍU Mateo Flecha (1481–1553)

David Coffin, Daniel Meyers, Mae Fuchs, Benjamin Horsburgh, *soloists* Concerto Incognito * Coro San Marco

The Catalan composer Flecha is best known for his musical *ensalada* (salads): works for four or five voices written in multiple languages to entertain palace courtiers. The nonsense syllables *ríu ríu chíu* may represent the song of a nightingale or a predatory kingfisher.

10. CHJAMA À GABRIELLU G. Gistucci/Tavagna & Malcolm Bothwell

Lysander Jaffe, Gideon Crevoshay, Sophie Michaux, voice

This unique Corsican style of polyphony has been passed on through generations of oral tradition. The words translate as: "If God is called upon, may he send the messenger Gabriel...."

11. ÜSKÜDAR'A GIDER IKEN Traditional Turkish Song

Lysander Jaffe, *violin & voice* • Sophie Michaux & Gideon Crevoshay, *voice* Simon Martyn-Ellis, *plectra lute* • Nathaniel Cox, *cornetto* • Daniel Meyers, *riqq* Fabio Pirozzolo, *doumbek* • Coro San Marco

This melody has been adopted by so many cultures that the origin is nearly impossible to trace. Here we cover three versions with wildly different meanings. Verse one (Turkish) speaks of taking a trip with a beloved scribe. Verse two (Ladino), the traditional Sephardic variation, includes a mishmash of languages and tells of a beautiful girl with dark eyes. "Like the moon was her face, illuminating the boulevard..." Verse three (Arabic) sings of spiritual ecstasy.

12. GIRO GIRO TONDO Italian Children's Song

The Revels Ragazzi

A playful circle game, this version of a popular children's song and dance resembles the American *Ring Around the Rosy*.

13. LA BEFANA/MADAMA DORÈ

The Revels Ragazzi

La Befana, a female Santa Claus figure, is beautifully powdered and shod in shoes of chocolate. *Madama Dorè* is an Italian circle game that tells the story of the royal esquire's request that Madama Dorè give up one of her many beautiful daughters for marriage to the King of Spain.

14. SÌ DOLCE È'L TORMENTO Claudio Monteverdi (1567–1643)

Gideon Crevoshay, *tenor* • Fabio Pirozzolo, *frame drum* Simon Martyn-Ellis, *theorbo* • Nathaniel Cox, *cornetto* • Coro San Marco

The timeless story of unrequited love is told in this simple, melodic madrigal with a rich harmony supporting the tune and text.

15. SONATA SOPRA LA BERGAMASCA Salamone Rossi (1570–1630)

Daniel Meyers, recorder • Nathaniel Cox, cornetto • Simon Martyn-Ellis, theorbo

Rossi was a Jewish composer whose talent was so highly regarded that he was not required to wear the yellow badge that identified other Jews in the Mantua ghetto. Our stately dance reflects the spatial patterning of Renaissance styles.

16. QUEL SGUARDO SDEGNOSETTO Claudio Monteverdi/text Anonymous

Sophie Michaux, *mezzo soprano* • Simon Martyn-Ellis, *baroque guitar* Nathaniel Cox, *theorbo*

This 17th century virtuosic madrigal features some very modern-sounding twists and turns and includes these lyrics: "That haughty little glance, bright and menacing...."

17. SEMPRE ME RIDE STA Adrian Willaert (1490–1562)

Coro San Marco

Founder of the Venetian School and *maestro di cappella* at San Marco, Willaert brought northern polyphonic styles from his native Netherlands. Here the chorus sings: "This lady always makes fun of me when we pass in the street.... Ha ha ha!"

18. CAPRICCIATA E CONTRAPUNTO BESTIALE ALLA MENTE Adriano Banchieri (1568–1634)

Coro San Marco

A Benedictine monk, Banchieri was a true Renaissance man whose interests ranged from music theory, literature, linguistics and architecture. He composed both sacred hymns and witty Madrigal Comedies like this one for the secular masses.

19. AVE MARIA Jacob Arcadelt (1507–1568)/Arr. Russell Robinson

Coro San Marco Donne

As a young man, Arcadelt moved to Florence from his Franco-Flemish birthplace (now Belgium) to study with Philippe Verdelot, a master of the Renaissance madrigal form. Decades later, Arcadelt's admirer Albert Einstein wrote: "Here is attained the ideal of what the time expected of the *dolcezza* (sweetness) and the *suavità* (suaveness) of music."

20. MORRIS DANCE

The Pinewoods Morris Men • Daniel Meyers, pipe & tabor

This stick dance hails from the village of Upton on Severn in the Cotswold area of England.

21. LORD OF THE DANCE

David Coffin, *solo* • The Pinewoods Morris Men • The Company

"Simple Gifts" is the Shaker tune that Sydney Carter used to set these modern lyrics. It has been translated into dance using a compilation of traditional English Morris steps by Carol Langstaff, Martin Graetz and Jonathan Morse.

22. LIBERA ME DOMINE Traditional Sardinian

Gideon Crevoshay, *soloist* • Coro San Marco

Gideon learned this song from the singing of the *Concordu e Tenore de Orosei* and taught it to us. The timbre of Sardinian singing is characterized by a very forward and "buzzy" sound. This is sung in a Sardinian dialect: "Deliver me, O Lord, from death on that fearful day..."

23. ABBOTS BROMLEY HORN DANCE

The Pinewood Morris Men • Matthew Salgado, Jack Williams, Boy Archers

This ancient ritual dance for good luck in hunting the stag is still danced every year in the village of Abbots Bromley in England. Its supernumerary characters—the folk fool, the man-woman, the hobby horse and the boy archer—tie it to the mumming traditions of Christmas.

24. CINGARI SIMO Adrian Willaert (1490–1562)

Jamie Jaffe, *soloist* • Lakshmi Nayak, Gemma Smith Vondras, Milva McDonald, Corinne Boet-Whitaker, Haris Papamichael, *semi chorus* • Simon Martyn-Ellis, *plectra lute* Daniel Meyers, *ciaramella* • Fabio Pirozzolo, *bodhran & frame drum*

The lyrics, "We are gypsies come to play.... If we lose, we will pay a carlino. If you lose, you will pay for the wine" capture the essence of this piece.

25. ARIA DI FIRENZE Emilio de' Cavalieri (1550–1602)

Nathaniel Cox, cornetto • Simon Martyn-Ellis, Baroque guitar

Nathaniel Cox comments that this simple tune was well known in the first half of the 17th century. There is no surviving version for solo cornetto, so Nathaniel imagined what a virtuoso of the times might have improvised. Kelli Edwards' choreography builds through a series of four different dances with changing time signatures.

26. HO PERSO IL CAVALLINO A Choosing Game from Vicenza

The Revels Ragazzi

The words of this game translate as: "I have lost the little foal! What color clothes did it have? It had pink clothes. What color hair did it have? It had brown hair. What color eyes did it have? It had green eyes. What color shoes did it have? It had white shoes. What was its name? Its name was Tomi. I have found my little foal!"

27. LA BELLA FRANCESCHINA Anonymous

The Revels Ragazzi

Chorus sings: "There's the pretty Franceschina, that wanted a husband, and her father at the window, that hears what she says. Be silent Franceschina, said the father, I will give you a husband!"

28. MARIA Barbara Furtuna

Gideon Crevoshay, *lead vocal* • Lysander Jaffe & Jamie Jaffe, *vocals* • Daniel Meyers, *ocarina* Simon Martyn-Ellis, *Baroque guitar* • Nathaniel Cox, *theorbo* • Fabio Pirozzolo, *frame drum*

The Corsican ensemble Barbara Furtuna created this beautiful piece that is based upon a traditional shepherd's song called *La Carpinese*. We thank them for generously sharing the arrangement with us. This poignant piece is about Mary realizing her son's tragic fate.

29. IL COPRIFUOCO Italian Curfew Song

Translation from Italian: "Cover the fire. Good night!"



30. DONA NOBIS PACEM

Our traditional round for peace.



31. IL BALLERINO Giovanni Giacomo Gastoldi (1554–1609)

"Play a dance for me. I want to dance with my love," sings the chorus.

32. TONNAROTI Calabrian Sea Chantey

An Alan Lomax Calabrian field recording was the source for this traditional tuna fishing song: "Heave, heave! Raise the net...."

33. NEVIJSKA KOLEDA Croatian Christmas Blessing

"Three little birds flew out from a fine olive tree; the first carried grain and wheat to our fields, the second carried grapevines and olives to our vineyards, and the third carried health and joy to our village."

34. JÁCARAS Antonio de Santa Cruz (17th century)

Simon Martyn-Ellis, Baroque guitar

Jácaras are Spanish instrumental pieces, often used as an entr'acte of a theatrical performance or as a dance accompaniment.

35. MUMMERS' PLAY

Billy Meleady, Arlecchino • Mark Jaster, Pantalone • Noni Lewis, Isabella Sabrina Selma Mandel, Columbina • Richard Snee, Il Dottore • Orion Longsword The Pinewoods Morris Men • David Torrey, drum • Lauren Curtis, Fool Sam North, Ewan Swanson, hoop holders

Our Mummers' ragù was cooked up by Patrick Swanson with *Commedia Del'Arte* characters in a traditional English Mummers' play structure. The sword dance *II Bal do Sabre* (here danced by members by Orion Longsword and The Pinewoods Morris Men) comes from the Piedmont area of northwestern Italy. The linked-sword dance was not mentioned in print until the early 19th century although oral tradition places its origin several centuries earlier. Our presentation draws heavily on the version that is still performed in Bagnasco.

37. AGNUS DEI Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina (1525–1594)

Coro San Marco

"O Lamb of God...." Palestrina is one of the most beloved, prolific and innovative composers of the Renaissance. He is credited with the invention of fluid and consonant polyphony, which became the standard style of the late Renaissance and beyond.

38. THE SHORTEST DAY

David Coffin

This poem, written by Susan Cooper in 1977, has become a traditional part of *The Christmas Revels* performances in each of the nine Revels cities around the country.

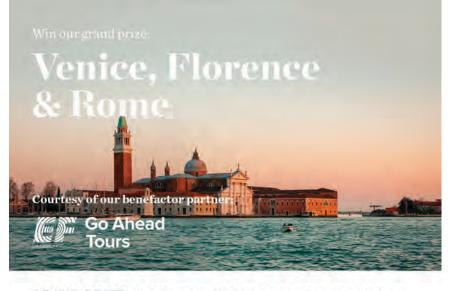

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PATRICK SWANSON Artistic Director began his career in London as an actor at the Arts Theatre in the West End. In 1969, he toured Europe with La MaMa Plexus and subsequently got his world theater education from Ellen Stewart at La MaMa E.T.C. in New York. His numerous directing projects include opera, ensemble, music theater and circus. He was a founding stage director of Circus Flora. Paddy taught acting and improvisation at the London Academy of Dramatic Art (LAMDA), the London Drama Centre and New York University. He served as artistic director of the Castle Hill Festival at Castle Hill in Ipswich, MA, directing and co-producing opera and

theater works, including the premiere of Julie Taymor's *Liberty's Taken* and Peter Sellars' *Cosi fan Tutte*. Amongst numerous directing projects in Europe and the U.S., his production of Shakespeare's *King Lear* with Alvin Epstein for Actors' Shakespeare Project was nominated for three 2006 Elliot Norton awards. His most recent A.S.P. production was *A Midsummer Night's Dream* with Paula Plum and Steve Barkhimer. For Revels, Pady has directed a contemporary version of the medieval mystery plays and *The Mysteries* by Tony Harrison, co-produced by Revels and Shakespeare & Company, and Britten's opera *Noye's Fludde*. He writes and directs all Cambridge Revels scripts and serves as consultant to the nine Revels production companies around the country.



MEGAN HENDERSON Music Director has lived in the Boston area since coming to the Walnut Hill School in 1976 from Altoona, PA. She graduated from the New England Conservatory with a degree in Piano Performance and is an active collaborative pianist and piano teacher. As a pianist, she has appeared on the Winsor Music Chamber Series and Music on Norway Pond. She has sung with the Early Music ensemble *Schola Cantorum* of Boston since its founding in 1982 and has appeared on many recordings with the Boston Camerata as a singer and keyboard player. Megan's passion for shape note and world folk music was ignited in her first session as a co-leader with Village Harmony Summer Camp over 25 years ago. She recently toured the

UK and Europe as a singer with Northern Harmony, a semi-professional ensemble made up of Village Harmony alumni and leaders. She first performed with Revels as a pianist in the production of *Noye's Fludde* and was the pianist in the 2014 Victorian *Christmas Revels* production. She is currently the organist and choir director at Payson Park Church in Belmont.



DAVID COFFIN Songleader & Musician has performed every year with Revels since 1980. Widely known for his rich baritone voice, David performs on an impressive array of musical instruments, including concertinas, recorders, penny-whistles, bombards, gemshorns, cornamuse, shawm, rauschphieffe—or, as he explains, "generally anything that requires a lot of hot air." At the heart of David's work is his extensive collection of songs from the maritime tradition. During the school year, David performs his highly acclaimed School Enrichment Programs throughout New England as a Revels Artist-in-Residence. In the summer months he can be found on a boat taking over 8,000 underserved

children to George's and Spectacle Islands in Boston Harbor. He is also the Director of Narration for Boston Harbor Cruises, leading tours and hiring/training all the narrators.



NATHANIEL COX cornettist & Lutenist began his music career as a trumpet player, earning degrees in trumpet performance and Russian literature from Oberlin College and Conservatory in 2008. After a brief period of Baroque trumpet playing (winning the historical category at the National Trumpet Competition in 2007), Nathaniel was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship to study cornetto with Bruce Dickey at the *Schola Cantorum* in Basel, Switzerland, earning a Masters' Degree in 2014. He started playing theorbo in 2011, and after six month had his first performance playing Monteverdi's "L'incoronazione di Poppea" with the Kammeroper Schloss Rheinsberg. In 2012 he and soprano Agnes Coakley founded the

ensemble *In Stile Moderno*, a group dedicated to performing rarely heard works from the 17th century. Since moving back to the US in 2014, Nathaniel has performed with some of North America's leading Early Music ensembles, including Apollo's Fire, The Toronto Consort, Ensemble Caprice and the Dark Horse Consort. Now based in Boston, he is a regular member of several groups, including Rumbarroco, a Latin-Baroque fusion ensemble.

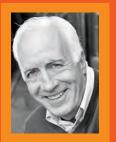

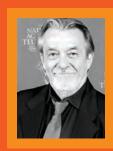

Heidi is particularly grateful to producer Lynda Johnson for making the process as smooth as possible despite the average of 113 costumes in a show. Just across Harvard Yard, Heidi

also designs the Harvard Hasty Pudding Show and finds that there is a surprising amount of crossover with Revels. A man/woman character appears in both productions but for the Pudding, Heidi just makes the skirts much, much shorter.



BILL WINN Sound Engineer has toured all over the world working with many of music's top acts such as Whitney Houston, Herbie Hancock and Joni Mitchell. He has designed and implemented sound for the *DC Jazz Festival*, 2004–2014; *Barbara Streisand Live at Shrine Auditorium*, 2000 DNC and *Thelonious Monk Jazz Competition*, 1987 to the present. His television-broadcast sound and mixing work has included the 2017 Emmy Award-nominated *Front Row Boston* (WGBH featuring Sean Lennon and Les Claypool), *The United Nation's International Jazz Day at the White House* (ABC, 2016) and *White House Tribute to Thelonious Monk* (2008). Bill has been working with Revels since the 1995. He met Revels

founder Jack Langstaff and former music director George Emlen while working on several Revels recordings with John Newton of Soundmirror. In 1999 Revels sound designer Berred Ouellette passed on the task of creating the Revels sound to Bill, who has been sitting at the board in orchestra row V every December since.



CARMINE BELLUCCI Illustrator is an Italian artist working and living in Padua. He attended the Istituto Europeo di Design (IED) in Milan and continued his studies in Type Design at Politecnico in Milan. In addition to his commissioned work a range of international clients, Carmine is involved in the underground visual subculture, founding the Interplay Art group and taking part in many local and national street art events. About his illustration for Revels, Carmine writes, "Working with the designers at Cahoots, I wanted to create a sparkling and festive atmosphere, an artwork where all the magic and beguiling attractions of Venice could merge in a harmonious celebration. The water sustains the whole composi-

tion as the Doge welcomes us to enter the most beautiful city in the world. There is history, masks, luxury, elegance and culture—but most of all there is togetherness, as everything and everyone celebrates life and parades along the bridges and *calli* of Venice, filling the air with laughter and carols."

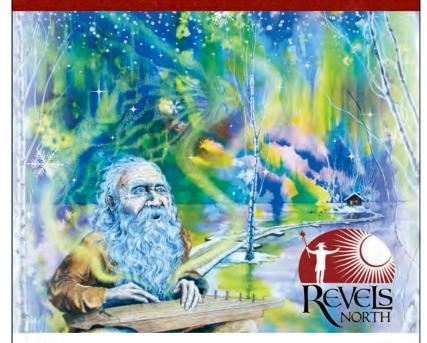

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THE CURIOUS APPEAL OF SLAPSTICK

to Venice Beac

In 1968 I was an eager novice in the resident actor company of a small theatre in the West End of London. It was there that I first came across a peculiar stage direction embedded in the script handed out at the first reading of the seasonal Christmas Panto. The "Panto" is a popular annual event in Britain; the whole family goes to cheer the heroes and hiss the villains and have a jolly good time of it. I was looking forward to the experience. The script was straightforward for a while—dialogue, song, dialogue, dance number, scene change—and then came the laconic direction: "*Frontcloth Trad.*" It took a couple more rehearsals before I had to secretly confess to the stage manager that I didn't know what "*Frontcloth Trad*" was. "Ah," he said, "That would be 'traditional business.' The actors will be doing their 'bits' in front of the

downstage traverse curtain (Frontcloth) to fill in while the upstage scenery is being changed for the big transformation scene. There's no end of bits: the ladder bit, the plank bit, the sausage bit, *lazzi*—you know—slapstick." And so they did. Remarkably, the older actors routined their

"bits" fluently. One move begat another, their timing was mysteriously synchronized and most important, they knew when the audience would laugh. It was as if they were speaking a secret language. (In fact some of them did speak a coded language used by actors and gays known as *Polari*, a mix of London rhyming slang, Romany, Backslang, Thieves' Cant and Italian. This was a way of talking so people around you didn't have a clue what you were talking about.) If the laugh wasn't big enough, these old pros would fine tune the gesture or the timing. I remember one of them pulling me aside after a tepid audience response to one of my routines that I thought

"Don't move after the slap," he said, "and don't change your expression. Count to three and then look at the audience." I followed his direction the following night and amazingly the laugh came just as he said it

would. This was "Trad," a traditional technique reaching all the way back to the piazzas of Venice and the 17^{th} century *Commedia del'Arte*.

The name "slapstick" originates from the Italian word bataccio, meaning a cricket-bat-like object made of two wooden slats. When struck, the *bataccio* produces a loud smacking noise even though it transfers very little force to the person being struck. Actors may thus hit each other comically and noisily without causing any actual pain. The Commedia del'Arte was performed mostly in outside spaces in markets and town squares and by actors who used a very broad physical comedy style to appeal to a very wide audience. They did not work from scripts but rather from scenarios that were rudimentary plots that they pinned to the back of their crude stage to guide the action. Each actor specialized in a particular stock character: the miser, the young lover, the mischievous prankster. the moon-faced fool. One class of madcap characters, the *zanni*, gives us our word "zany." Molière was one of many subsequent playwrights who recognized the value of the *Commedia* and adapted the characters for the legitimate stage. He recognized that *lazzi* were little studies of observational comedy-human tics and traits exaggerated for comic effect.

The themes in *Commedia* are primitive. Hunger plays a large part, as do lust, greed, boastfulness and trickery. Exaggeration creates surreal situations. Arlecchino's insatiable hunger leads him to make an elaborate and delicious meal of a fly. Physical slaps and feints turn into all-out battles with flying props and wild chases that can be interrupted by people becoming invisible by turning into statues. Characters get into trouble, bullies get their righteous comeuppance and the trickster escapes just one more time. And

amazingly, as these old actors were proving, if you got the gesture and the timing just right, the old gags made people laugh. "Watch the silent movies, love!" was the advice handed down to me.

The birth of the silent movie industry owed a great deal to *Commedia* and to the Canadian impresario Mack Sennett of Keystone Cops fame. Custard pies and bathing beauties were symbols of his movies. In 1912 he founded the Keystone Studios in Edendale, California. The original main building, the first enclosed film stage and studio ever constructed, is still there today. The list of film actors whose careers were cemented with Sennett is impressive and includes Harry Langdon, Charlie Chaplin, Fatty Arbuckle, Harold Lloyd, Gloria Swanson, Chester Conklin,

Bing Crosby and W.C. Fields. Sennett's signature Keystone Cops used every trick in the *Commedia* book as actors skidded around corners and jumped over each other in an endless chase scene that involved ladders and planks, hoses and other paraphernalia. A great promoter, Sennett created the Venice Beach

The birth of the silent movie industry owed a great deal to *Commedia* and to the Canadian impresario Mack Sennett of Keystone Cops fame. Custard pies and bathing beauties were symbols of his movies.

beauty contests that launched the careers of several starlets of the silver screen, including the screwball beauty Carole Lombard (the highest-paid screen actress in the 1930s).

Sometimes a *Commedia* routine shows its origins very clearly. In "The Goldrush," Charlie Chaplin is so hungry that he boils his shoe and eats it, rolling the laces on his fork like spaghetti and delicately nibbling around the bony tacks on the leather sole. It is an exquisite redux version of "Arlecchino and the Fly" that neatly and poetically dissolves the years and the miles between Renaissance Venice and Venice Beach, CA in the 1920s.

Paddy Swanson

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The characteristic twinkle in Paddy Swanson's eye could have lit up a moonless night when he suggested the theme of this year's show. As artistic director of Revels he knew full well this was a slam dunk idea to present to an Early Music-loving music director. Having spent the last 30 something years singing Renaissance music with the *Schola Cantorum* of Boston, I jumped at the chance to bring some of this wonderful music to a Revels production. Motets, madrigals, masses, operas, Monteverdi, the Gabrielis, Palestrina, polychoral music and choirs

of anitiphonal brass filling the grand San Marco Basilica...all come to mind when the Venetian Renaissance is mentioned to musicians. Thus, the luxury problem presented itself: how to pare down so much magnificent

music from this time and place so people could make it home from the show in time to celebrate New Year's Eve? Fortunately, some of the pieces that did not find a home in the show made it to our new *Tutta Bella!* CD. There, for example, you will find the wonderful "Lamento Della Ninfa," which is likely to convert any skeptical listener into a fan of Monteverdi.

Basilica San Marco di Venezia in the 15th and 16th centuries was more than a place of worship. The cathedral also housed two music schools. One school attracted composers of the Flemish tradition of counterpoint, including Adrian Willaert, an innovative secular musician. Willaert composed large-scale, sacred works expressly for the enormous cathedral with its multiple balconies. The second school was founded to train young clergymen to sing chant and polyphony. Tensions mounted

between the two schools and a fight eventually broke out...on a feast day, no less! The sacred and secular, light and dark, the poignant and comic, the mysterious rhythm of the seasons: all find a place in our Revels show this year.

Many beautiful and weird instruments will be played! The theorbo is an impossibly large lute with a minimum of 14 strings that was invented in Florence in the 16th century. The cornetto is a leather-

wrapped wooden instrument with a small, trumpet-like mouthpiece and fingerholes like those of the recorder. Don't be fooled by how easy

Nathaniel Cox makes it sound; this is a devilishly hard instrument to play. The *ciaramella* and shawms are predecessors of the oboe and come fully equipped with the gift of volume. Finally, the *zampogna* is a traditional Italian bagpipe. All are played by gifted hands.

Lysander Jaffe and Gideon Crevoshay are two wonderful musicians I met in my work and travels with Village Harmony. They have each spent time studying and performing music with local specialists in various countries, including Corsica, Sardinia and Turkey. The idea of expanding the musical landscape for the show beyond some jolly madrigals and lovely motets was irresistible with Lysander and Gideon on board, especially knowing that Renaissance Venice was such a multicultural destination for artists, musicians and merchants. Sophie Michaux is well known in the Early Music circles of Boston and is well versed in many World Music traditions. She is the perfect bridge between these two musical worlds. Nathaniel Cox and I met when he was playing theorbo for a Schola Cantorum concert. It was the icing on the Venetian cake to find out he is also a virtuosic cornetto player. The rest of our top-shelf band came by word-of-mouth recommendation and we are guite lucky to have Fabio Pirozzolo as our tradition bearer. (Thank you, James Gerke!) All of the musicians made terrific suggestions regarding repertoire. Magic happens when we bring different musical practices and areas of expertise to the party. It is a privilege to be in the midst of such alchemy.

No matter where your musical affinities lie, we hope to open your eyes, ears and spirits to something new and intriguing. Perhaps the music will move you to add Corsica, Croatia, Turkey and Sardinia to your itinerary when you book your trip to Venice!

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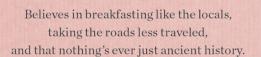
