

You play an important role in this wonderful production.


Please join us as you are able in singing, dancing, tapping your feet, enjoying the thousands of elements that knit this production together, and most of all reveling in this joyous season of celebration.

Welcome to the 53rd Annual Midwinter Revels in Sanders Theatre!

This year our Revels takes us back to our medieval roots and the land of mythology and folk tales. Annually, a powerful king and his three fools visit a special village on the shortest day to participate in the ceremonial burning of the yule log and the kindling of the first light of the new year. Only a king's crown can ward off danger when the dying light is carried from the old year to the new. Simultaneously at this precarious time, the annual Feast of Fools turns everything upside down. 

This jubilant Latin Christmas carol, often called "The Boys' Carol," first appeared in the *Moosburg Graduale* of 1360, although with different words. The present setting, adapted from an arrangement by Jerome Epstein, is based on the text and tune as they appeared in *Piae Cantiones*, a Scandinavian songbook published in 1582.

A Morris dance in the Fieldtown tradition, "Mrs. Casey's" distinctive qualities include its "heel-and-toe" step and the hand-clapping chorus. The Pinewoods Morris Men dance a version heavily influenced by the dancing of Great Western Morris in Exeter, England.

LEEDS WAITS' WASSAIL

Wassail (from the Anglo-Saxon "wes hal," meaning "be well") is a spicy drink used for wishing visitors good health. Wassailers travel from house to house singing and bestowing good luck to the hosts for the coming year in return for a little food and drink.

PEASANT DANCE

A dance modeled after medieval dance patterns created by Susan Dibble, to the 20th-century tune "The Gypsy Dance" by John Renbourn.

LORD OF MISRULE

In England, the Lord of Misrule—known in Scotland as the Abbot of Unreason and in France as the Prince des Sots—was appointed by popular vote during the Christmas season to preside over the Feast of Fools. The Lord of Misrule was generally a peasant or someone of lower station appointed to be in charge of Christmas revelries, which often included drunkenness and wild partying.

RIU RIU CHIU

Catalan Shepherding Song By Mateo Flecha the Elder

This classic Catalan Christmas song is a *villancico*—a refrain song similar to the English carol—composed probably by Mateo Flecha the Elder and published in Venice in 1556. The refrain is a metaphor; the singer asks the shepherd to protect the ewe (Virgin Mary) from the wolf (Devil). The verses tell of the story of Christ's birth. "Riu riu chiu" is the traditional call a Catalan shepherd makes when guarding sheep.

O CRUOR SANGUINIS

By Hildegard von Bingen

This antiphon is one of many chants by the influential German abbess, visionary, composer, poet, artist, theologian, and diplomat, Hildegard von Bingen (1098-1179): "Blood that bled into a cry! The elements felt its touch and trembled, Heaven heard their woe. O life-blood of the maker, scarlett music, salve our wounds." This hauntingly beautiful piece was, apparently, left incomplete.

DIES IRAE (INSTRUMENTAL)

One of the most recognizable and earliest of Christian hymns, part of the Requiem Mass liturgy. The words reflect vividly and emotionally on the terrors of Judgement Day.

One of the richest sources of medieval English lyrics, both secular and devotional, is the *Harley MS 2253* (c. 1320). Though there is no music which survives with the poems, many of these pieces were set to music popular at the time. This setting is by John Fleagle, arranged by Barbara Allen Hill.

This song for two voices first appeared in the *Llibre Vermell* ("red book" in Catalan) of Monserrat. The 14th-century compilation of texts and music was intended for singing and dancing by pilgrims visiting the famous shrine near Barcelona.

An ancient ritual dance for good luck in hunting the stag, still danced every year in the village of Abbots Bromley in Staffordshire, England. Its supernumerary characters—the folk fool, the man-woman, the hobbyhorse, and the boy archer—link it with the mumming traditions of Christmas.

(Last verse written by Patrick Swanson.)

VERANO PORTEÑO

Originally written in 1965, this tango is one part of a set of four written by Piazzolla collectively known as the Estaciones Porteñas, or The Four Seasons of Buenos Aires. Initially scored for violin, guitar, double bass, and bandoneón (a South American concertina), it has been rearranged here for brass by Elijah Botkin.



The mummers play, an essential ingredient in every Revels, concerns itself with the death of the old year and the birth of the new, A hero is challenged by an opponent, they fight, and eventually the hero is slain. Science (in the form of the doctor) fails to bring him back to life. Eventually some form of associative magic does the job. In the northern hemisphere, mistletoe, which seems to understand the trick of flourishing in the depths of winter, is a favorite restorative. The hero revives, filled with wonder after his passage from death to life, and is welcomed back into the community. Some form of this ritual enactment is shared by many cultures across the globe. This interpretation by Patrick Swanson is a distant relation to the popular version of the British hero-combat play, Saint George and the Dragon.

THE UPTON STICK DANCE

Pinewoods Morris Men Tom Kruskal or Jan Elliott, concertina Boney: Susan Dibble or Laurel Swift

Morris dancing can be traced back to the mid-15th century and has long been associated with towns and villages in the south Midlands of England. By Shakespeare's time, Morris dancing had become a highly popular form of team dancing at events such as local May Day observances, church ales, Whitsuntide celebrations, and field blessings. This Morris dance, created by Geoff Hughes of the Chingford Morris Men in 1962, is distantly related to one collected by Maud Karpeles in 1925 in Upton-upon-Severn, a small town in Worcestershire near the Welsh border.



FEATURED ARTISTS



Patrick "Paddy" Swanson (Co-Director, Revels Artistic

Director) began his career in London as an actor at the Arts
Theatre in the West End. In 1969, following a European tour with
the La MaMa Plexus Troupe, he moved to New York and
received his world theater education as a resident actor at La
MaMa E.T.C. His numerous directing projects include opera,
ensemble pieces, music-theater, and circus. He was a founding
stage director of Circus Flora. Paddy taught acting and
improvisation at the London Academy of Dramatic Art (L.A.M.D.A.),

the London Drama Centre, and the Tisch School of the Arts at N.Y.U. He served as artistic director of the Castle Hill Festival in Ipswich, Massachusetts, directing and co-producing opera and theater works, including the premieres of Julie Taymor's *Liberty Taken* and Peter Sellars' *Cosi fan tutte*. He directed the Boston Camerata in *Tristan and Iseult* at the Spoleto USA festival and *Shirley Valentine* at the Alley Theatre, Houston. His Actor's Shakespeare Project production of Shakespeare's *King Lear* with Alvin Epstein was nominated for three 2006 Elliot Norton awards and subsequently transferred Off-Broadway. Paddy's most recent acting role was as Father Jack in Brian Friel's *Dancing at Lughnasa* at Gloucester Stage. He currently researches, writes, and directs all Cambridge Revels scripts and serves as consultant to the other eight Revels production companies performing throughout the United States. He is delighted to be co-directing this year's *Midwinter Revels* with his brilliant colleague and conspirator, Debra Wise.



Debra Wise (Co-Director, Revels Associate Artistic Director)

co-founded Underground Railway Theater in Oberlin, Ohio; from 1978-2008, URT toured original works in the collaborative spirit of the Underground Railroad to venues ranging from Lincoln Center. to schools, to Symphony Hall, including Sanctuary-The Spirit of Harriet Tubman, Home is Where, InTOXICating, and Christopher Columbus Follies; with the Boston Symphony, Firebird, Creation of the World, and Tempest. As URT's Artistic Director, she created performances for non-traditional venues

including Museum of Science, MIT Museum, Mary Baker Eddy Library, the MFA, and the streets of Cambridge. After co-founding Central Square Theater with The Nora Theatre Company in 2008, Wise co-founded Catalyst Collaborative@MIT, CST's science theater partnership. She led partnerships with Mount Auburn Cemetery and the National Park Service (Roots of Liberty-The

Haitian Revolution and the American Civil War). Productions Wise helmed have won Elliot Norton awards, including Vanity Fair; black odyssey boston; The Convert, and Constellations. Acting appearances at CST have included Angels in America, Half-Life of Marie Curie, Homebody, Copenhagen, Einstein's Dreams, Arabian Nights; other stages include Commonwealth Shakespeare, New Rep, Speakeasy, Boston Playwrights, and the Public in NYC (The Haggadah, designed by Julie Taymor). She has adapted for the stage works by Dickens, Grace Paley, Lewis Carroll, and Gregory Maguire. She developed the Art Works for Schools curriculum with Harvard's Project Zero, the DeCordova Museum, and area schools. Wise left her CST Artistic Director position in 2022 to invite diverse leadership; she continues as CoChair of the CC@MIT Advisory Committee. She co-authored a digital book on URT's history (URTheaterEbook.com) and her third audiobook, The Witch of Maracoor by Gregory Maguire, was released this fall. She is honored to be wokring with Paddy Swanson and to join the remarkable Revels.



Elijah Botkin (Music Director, Revels Music Director), a Bostonbased conductor, arranger, choral educator, and performer, was named Revels' Music Director in December of 2021. He graduated

named Revels' Music Director in December of 2021. He graduated from Northeastern University in 2015 with bachelor's degrees in Music History & Analysis and Mathematics. While at Northeastern, Elijah founded and directed the Northeastern Madrigal Singers, served as President and Assistant Conductor for the NU Choral Society, and sang with and arranged for the award-winning a cappella group Distilled Harmony. Elijah's work on Distilled Harmony's quarterfinal-winning performance set won the

Championship of Collegiate A Cappella. His arrangement of "Nothing Feels Like You" by Little Mix also won a CARA (Contemporary A Cappella Recording Award) for Best Mixed Collegiate Song. In 2014, Elijah was granted the Gideon Klein Award in order to write his composition "The Closed Town", which was premiered by the Northeastern University Chamber Choir in April 2015. In addition to his role with Revels, Elijah continues to direct the NU Madrigal Singers and was recently named the Spring Music Director of the Reading Community Singers. He is also a frequent performer with a variety of professional ensembles in the Boston area, with recent and upcoming performances including appearances with Carduus and the Renaissonics at New England Conservatory's First Mondays concert series, with the Nightingale Vocal Ensemble for their concert, *Avian Menagerie*, and with the NU Madrigal Singers for their Tenth-Year Anniversary Concert in April 2023.



Vincent Ernest Siders (King) is a stage director, actor, producer, educator, and theater consultant. Currently he is the Director and Lead Instructor for the 'Ambassadors', the touring division of Youth Underground at Central Square Theater. Vincent has served as Artistic Director for two theater companies, both in Boston: New African Company and TYG Productions — Home of the Family Beef Feast Festival. In March of 2024, Vincent will perform as Othello at the Apollinaire Theater in Chelsea.



Laurel Swift (Boney) is a performer, composer, and workshop leader. ALEX HALL 'OBBY OSS FUND



THAT IS THE QUESTION.



Throughout human history civilizations have puzzled over the great mysteries of life and death. From stone age observation of the natural cycles of the sun, moon and earth and their relationship to the event that they characterized as the dying of the year, to the present scientific study of black holes, quantum mechanics, nanotechnology, and parallel universes, we seem to be no closer to understanding. The search for meaning in the pattern of birth, life and death in nature pushes the boundaries of human imagination. Science digs for explanations of the natural world but acknowledges that the solid land of human knowledge is forever bordered by an ocean of mystery. To cross this shoreline requires learning the language of metaphor, the grammar of mythology and religion, and the syntax of storytelling and magic.

The ancient Greeks and our African, Asian, and other aboriginal ancestors created myths to explain creation, and populated the heavens with fallible gods that gave meaning to human behavior. Their triumphs and passions, their jealousies and conflicts, mirrored the complex and messy inner universe of humankind, and offered an external perspective on human relationships. Monotheistic religions followed explaining existence through the lens of faith within a comprehensive and all-knowing divine plan. No matter the God or gods, the theories, or the beliefs, there seems to be a consensus on the limits of human understanding that brings us at the end of life to the shores of the sea of mystery.

The limen, the door or threshold in ancient Rome, was looked after by a god named Janus who was depicted as having two faces – one an old man looking backwards the other a young man looking forwards. Having a foot in both worlds was a rare gift extended to gods, priests, shamans, and, tellingly, to fools. Lacking the constraints of reason, the liminal fool leaps before he looks and is rewarded for his folly with access to mysteries beyond the human experience. The paradox of the wise fool runs through history and literature alongside a trickle of humor that can swell into the laughter of recognition, arguably the greatest gift of the gods.

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IMAGES IN FEAST OF FOOLS TO DRIVE THE DARK AWAY



Our Feast of Fools is set loosely in the late Middle Ages and early Renaissance (say, 14th to 16th centuries), on an imagined island and in mythical environs referencing cultures in areas we now know as northern Europe and Britain. Though fantasy, our story centers potent objects and traditions with deep roots in documented practices for celebrating the winter solstice — the shortest day of the year.

We think of a crown as indicating power and rank, but the metaphorical crown of immortality has been represented throughout history. Sometimes it is a circle of stars, or a laurel wreath. An Advent crown of candles and evergreens is worn to mark St. Lucy's Day, and is connected to the winter solstice. Holly (a symbol of eternal life) and mistletoe (considered a magical fertility blessing, probably leading to today's tradition of kissing under the mistletoe) both figure in our story.

The Yule log dates back to early solstice ritual bonfires. Common practice calls for burning a portion of the log in the hearth each evening until Twelfth Night (Jan. 6th), an emblem of the return of the sun. What remains of the log would sometimes be placed beneath the bed for protection from (ironically) fire, and saved to light the following year's Yule log. People would search for shapes or sparks made by the Yule log's fire to forecast the future new year. Candles would be lit from the Yule log by the youngest person present, while all were silent and made a wish. Used as far back as ancient Rome to represent the reborn sun, candles are at the center of scores of seasonal traditions, including Hanukkah, the Jewish festival of lights.



Another path for lightening the darkness is, of course, laughter.

Our Fools hearken to court jesters in Medieval Europe, when they emerged from a wide range of backgrounds: a university dropout who wrote poetry, a monk thrown out of a priory, the apprentice of a village blacksmith whose fooling amused a passing nobleman, a talented dancer or musician. Often these jesters were rewarded with land as payment for loyal service. A fool named Roland le Pettour was given 30 acres by England's King Henry II, on condition that Roland returned to court every year on Christmas Day to "leap, whistle and fart." In most cases, the fool had the right to sit at table with the King, and say whatever came into their head. Outside the court, there were 'Fool Societies', particularly popular in France; these amateurs sometimes performed at Christmas, a tradition that feels connected to the Mummers' tradition as it is reflected in our Feast of Fools.

Although the jester died out as a European court institution by the eighteenth century, the Fool transcends time. As theologian Harvey Cox writes, the Fool is "tricked, humiliated, and tromped upon... infinitely vulnerable, but never finally defeated." There are connections to explore between the medieval jester, the sufi dervish, the Jewish badhan, the Hopi Koshare, the zen monk, the primitive trickster, the circus clown, the standup: buffoonery that is an invitation to discovery and a celebration of possibilities.

Let us emulate in this New Year the Fool's joyful and irrepressibly radical hope: a talent for seeking — and being surprised and delighted by — the return of the light.
